Surthriving Law School

The law field seems exciting with its dramatic court cases, big judgments, fancy suits, high pay, and flashy lifestyle.

Before you invest \$100,000s in a private law school, make sure you want to do it and have a clear career path to use that J.D. Plus, do you want to study thick books for three years, and read documents for 14 hours every day to prepare for trials?

Upsilon alumnus Adam Hunt matriculated to one of the best schools in the country, Northwestern Univ., and worked in numerous public and private sectors over the past decade. He has a unique perspective, and began blogging about it when aspiring law school students approached him. That turned into a book, "Surthriving Law School (and Beyond)," that helps college graduates determine if law school with its glories and pitfalls is truly right for them.



When students approach him, he writes, Step 1 is to figure out what it is you actually want to do first, then figure out if law school will help you accomplish that goal, or if there might be another path that is directly tied to what you truly want and enjoy in life.

Hunt gives the example of someone who is interested in the entertainment industry, where lawyers spend their time reviewing the minutiae of contracts and distribution agreements. New associates are parked in front of computer screens all day, and have little interaction with other attorneys. Senior lawyers talk to them only to give them more tasks. So, if someone is interested in working with actors, the creative processes of writing, and film production, then a law degree would not lead to those types of jobs.

Most Northwestern graduates pursued jobs at large private firms, because they had \$200,000 in school loans. Hunt reminds students that graduating from an expensive private school is no guarantee that you will get that high-paying BigLaw job to actually pay off that debt. And you may find yourself to working 80-hour weeks for a decade, and compromising any personal or social life for years and potentially resulting in mental distress. You also may not have enough money to buy a house, take a vacation or pay for emergency expenses.

Hunt mitigated crazy hours by setting aside time for daily meditation, and playing sports with classmates to ensure he had a physical outlet and socialized with friends.

Public schools can provide equally good law degrees at a lower cost, especially our great UCLA, UC Berkeley and UC Irvine. One Upsilon alumnus' father graduated from West Virginia Univ., a middle-tier law school, but his brains allowed him to be hired by Citibank, one of the world's big banks.

Many college graduates matriculate directly to law school, but taking several years to see the world and gain experience can mold a better-rounded candidate. Hunt worked for the California State Assembly on a fellowship after graduation from UCLA, and then for a presidential campaign as a field organizer in Iowa and Michigan. He also started a business that sold poker-related clothing (fun but unprofitable and disbanded) and worked at a bar (the booze kind).

Hunt made sure that he explored both the public and private sectors while he has time during law school. His first year internship was in public service with the Dept. of Justice's Anti-Trust

group in Washington, D.C. During his third year, he externed for a Magistrate as part of a judicial practicum.

During his second year, he interned for a BigLaw firm in New York, a top 20 firm that went bankrupt in the 2008 recession, right as he was ready to graduate.

Hunt also recruited contributors to offer their own perspectives. A guest writer began interning with a public interest non-profit, and was thrown into the middle of policy-making for the organization. She even wrote amicus briefs and a federal Circuit and the Supreme Court. By the time she was nearing graduating from Vermont law school, the organization created a full-time staff position for her. As a staff lawyer, she has been lead counsel on 30 1st Amendment cases, and argued cases on four federal Circuits and before the Supreme Court. She is interviewed regularly for print and TV as an expert in her field.

As another guest writer said, "Each of us only gets to pass this way once. Do it right. Be true to yourself and your passions. And above all else, believe in yourself."

Hunt started at a BigLaw firm in New York, and then moved to its Los Angeles office. He found another BigLaw job, but he was itching for something new. He was able to get a secondment at Sony Pictures, where his law firm "loaned" him to work for the client on a short-term basis. While there, he learned more about the entertainment field, and determined that an in-house counsel job was a better fit that eliminated billable hour requirements and provided a superior life-job balance.

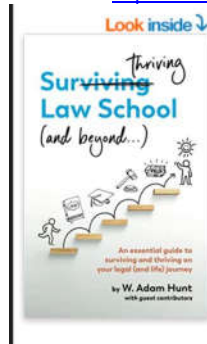
Hunt continues to work at another global entertainment company in Los Angeles, and he made the right choice, because he charted a course that took him in-house in an industry that about which he cared. Also, he started writing his second book, "Be Happy Law," to provide lessons learned to help miserable practicing lawyers improve their life-work balance.

Another benefit of law school was meeting his wife. On the first day of orientation at Northwestern, Hunt was running late, and the only open seat was next to a lovely lady named, Alexis. The students were told to look left and right at their new classmates, so Hunt struck up a conversation, and the rest is legal history.

Upsilon 100 Centennial Campaign (1923-2023)

Alumni have donated \$81,000 as part of our "Upsilon 100 Campaign, with the goal of raising \$100,000 for our Educational Scholarship Fund by 2023. 46 brothers have donated, with an average donation of \$1,050. 26 have donated more than \$1,000.

Adytum on High: Carl Kruger



Col. Carl Kruger, #269 (1921-7/28/2019): Brother Kruger, a U.S. Army Veteran who saw combat in WWII and Vietnam, passed to the Adytum on High in 2019 in Palmyra, Vir. He was Initiation #269 - one of the oldest living brothers at age 98.



Kruger was the son of Carl Gustave Kruger and Eleanor Tenney of Toms River, N.J., and he was raised by his loving grandmother Sophia Kruger, and aunts Amanda and Eleanor Kruger of Los Angeles, Calif. He was preceded in passing by his wife of 60 years, Frances Daly Kruger; son-in-law Col. James L. Bryan, and grandson Carl W. Kruger.

Kruger was a man without peer, a true gentleman in every sense of the word. He was a professional officer who served a 30-year career in the regular Army. He was a combat veteran of World War II and Vietnam, decorated for valor, and an intellectual with a master's degree in business from Stanford University. He was an avid hunter, fisher and woodworker, but his real joy in life was his role as a devoted husband and loving father of three. He lived a life that most people only read about.

Kruger is survived by his loving children: Col. Carl M. Kruger and wife Daniela, Amanda K. Bryan, and Col. Kelly D. Kruger and wife Mary; his devoted 11 grandchildren: Melissa B. Kruger, Lt. Col. Patrick L. Bryan, Katherine G. Kruger, Cassandra D. Bryan, Steven D. Kruger, Amanda K. Carter, Maj. Carl M. Kruger, Martha L. Kruger, Daniel J. Bryan, Cadet Kelly D. Kruger, and John F.
