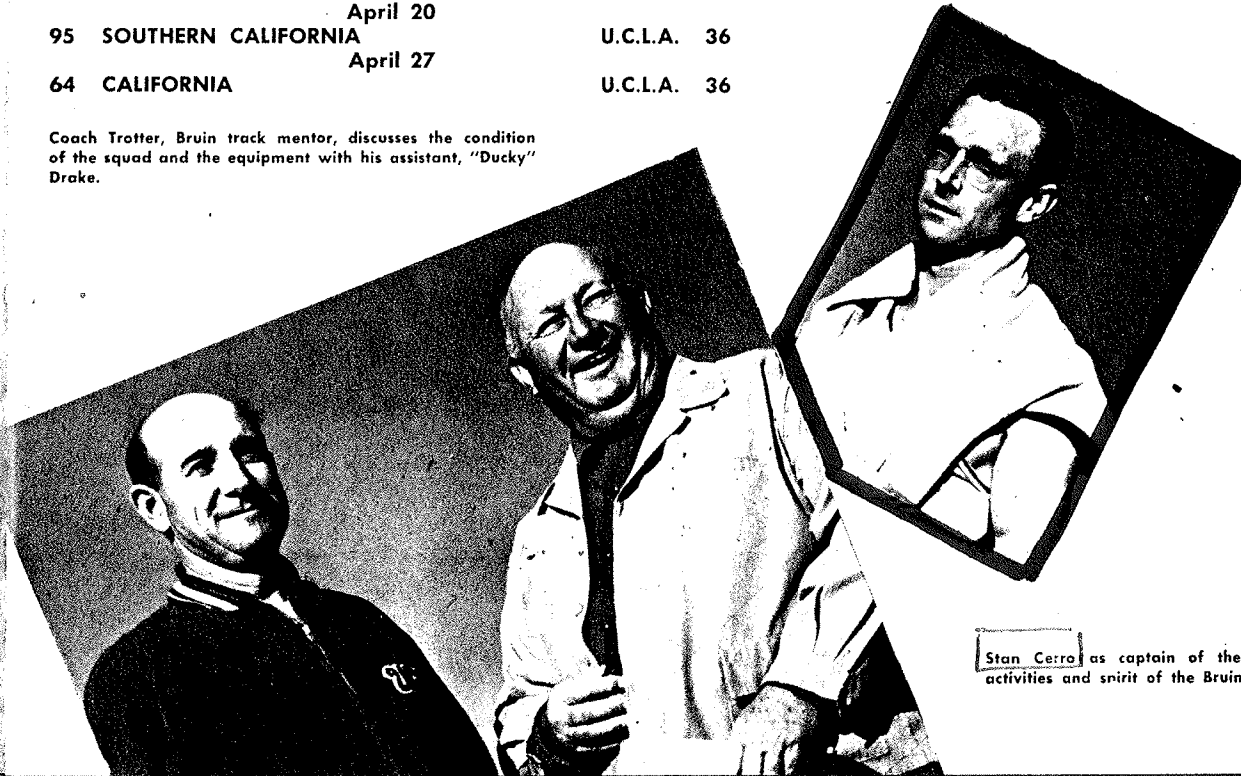

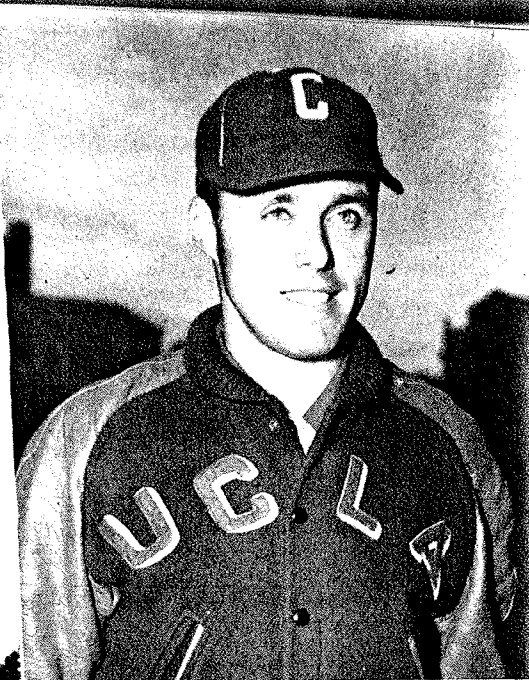

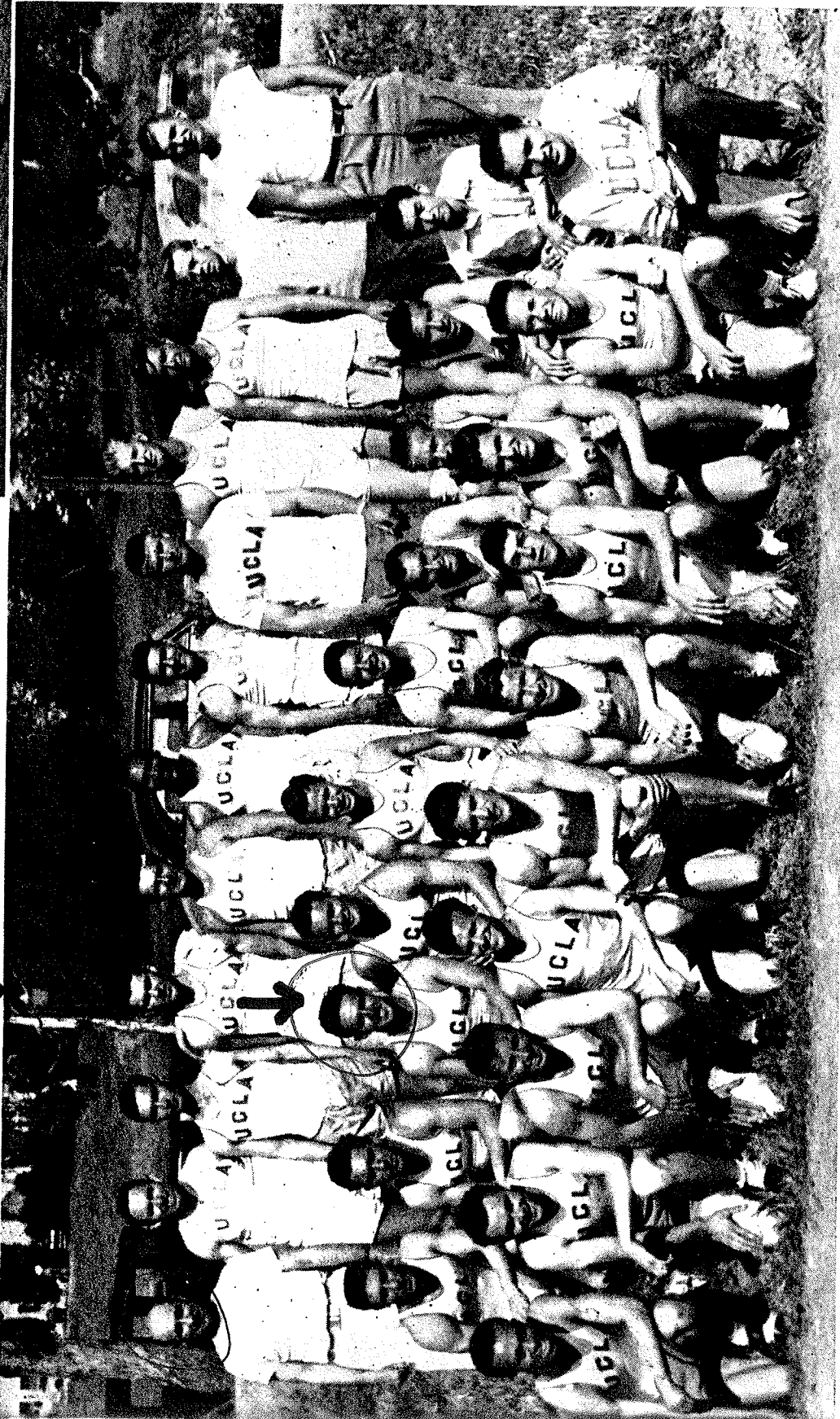

Margaret Whiting, national sweetheart of Sigma Pi, and many prominent alumni on campus attended the "Twenties" celebration. Among them were Robert Hillen, crew coach, and "Ducky" Drake, track coach. It was old home week when Cecil Hollingsworth, chief football scout, and Paul Hutchinson, president of the UCLA Alumni Association, put in their appearance at the most stupendous Sigma Pi party in the fraternity's UCLA history. The first fraternity on campus, Sigma Pi was chartered on the old Vermont campus where it was known as "Ball and Chain."
