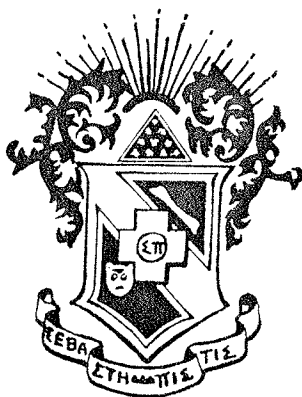

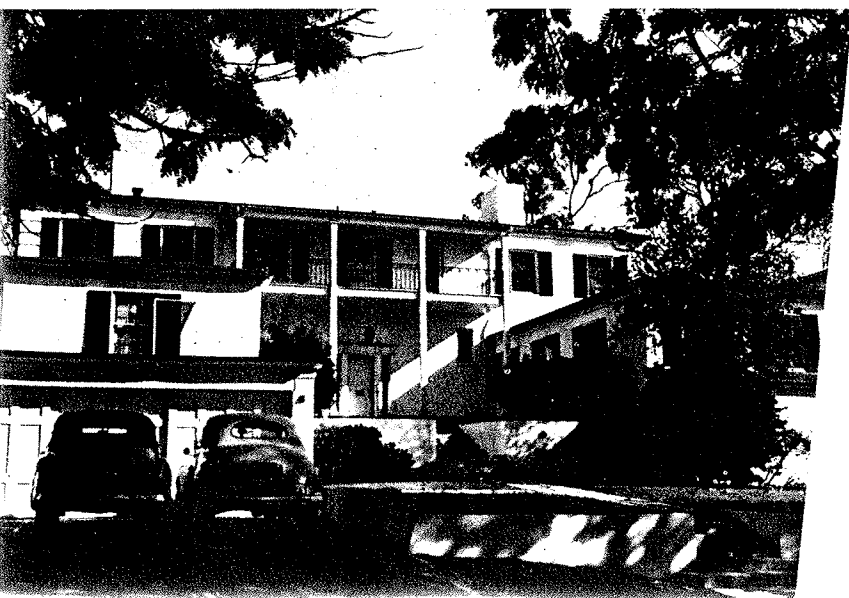
Last Frontier of the old West was the Sigma Pi house when dolls and dudes dressed for the occasion, in whatever they could round up on the open range.

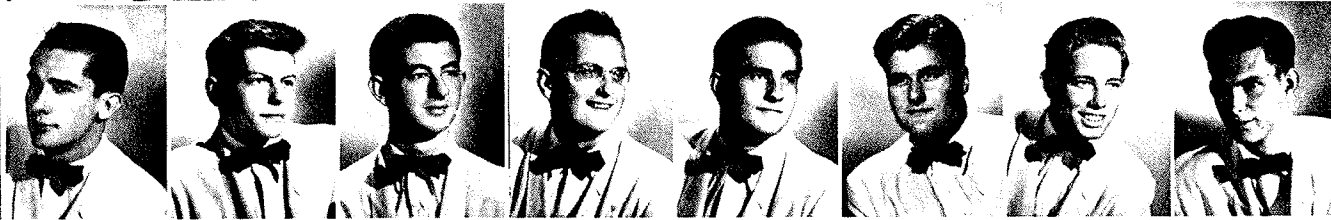


Magnolia trees and mint juleps would be a perfect setting for this southern mansion, home of the Sigma Pi's.

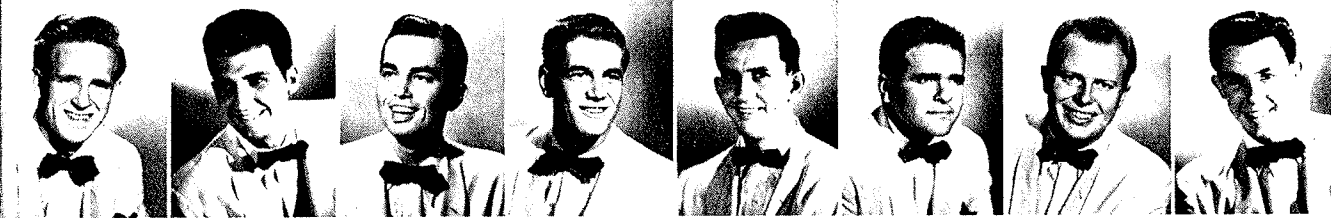

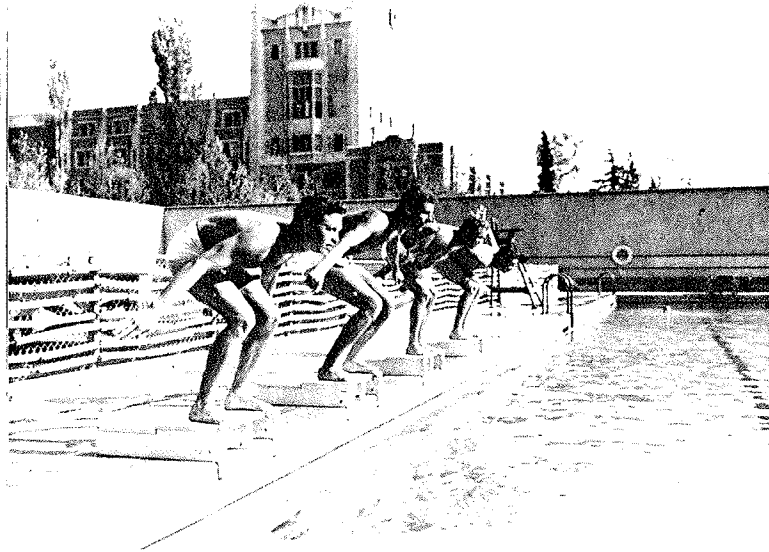

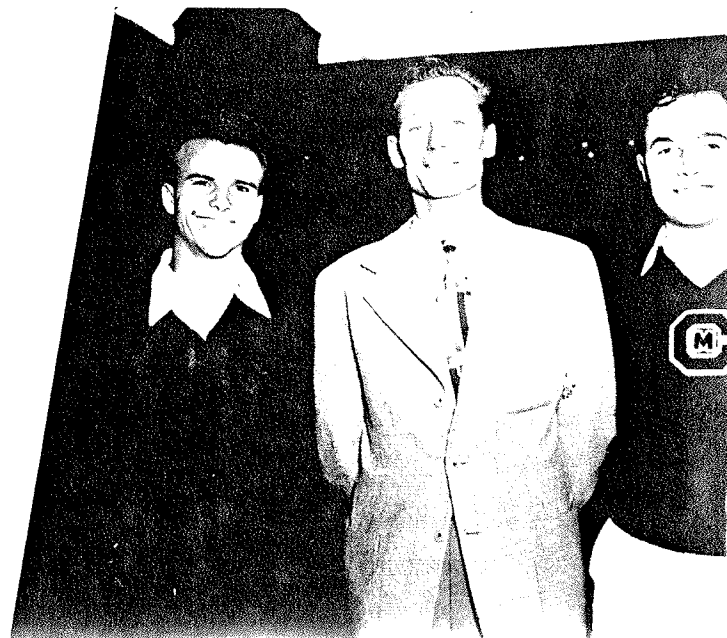

Close in the running were George Selig, who ran the best race of his career, John Owens, and Al Minjares; a rounded trio which may easily fan into victory during future seasons.
