

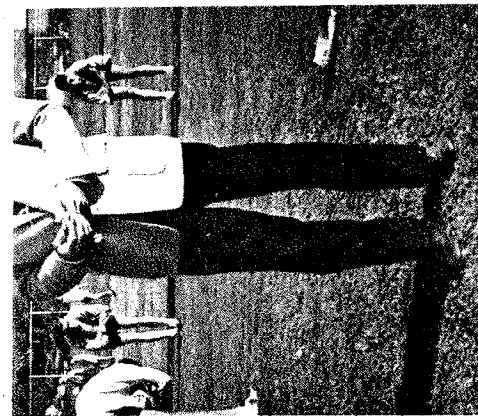

CROSS COUNTRY

Depth was one of the strong points of the 1957 UCLA Cross Country team. Lacking in experience, but with plenty of desire and conditioning, the Bruins managed to take the unofficial championship of California by defeating the University of Southern California, California, and Stanford in dual meet competition. Also, in winning the team championship of the 5,000 meter Southern California meet, the blue clad harriers bested such strong teams as San Jose State, Occidental and the University of Southern California. The first annual PCC championship cross country meet held at Westwood saw the Bruins outscored by the strong teams from the University of Idaho and the University of Oregon, but able to garner the third place ahead of five other conference schools, thus ending a successful and victorious season.

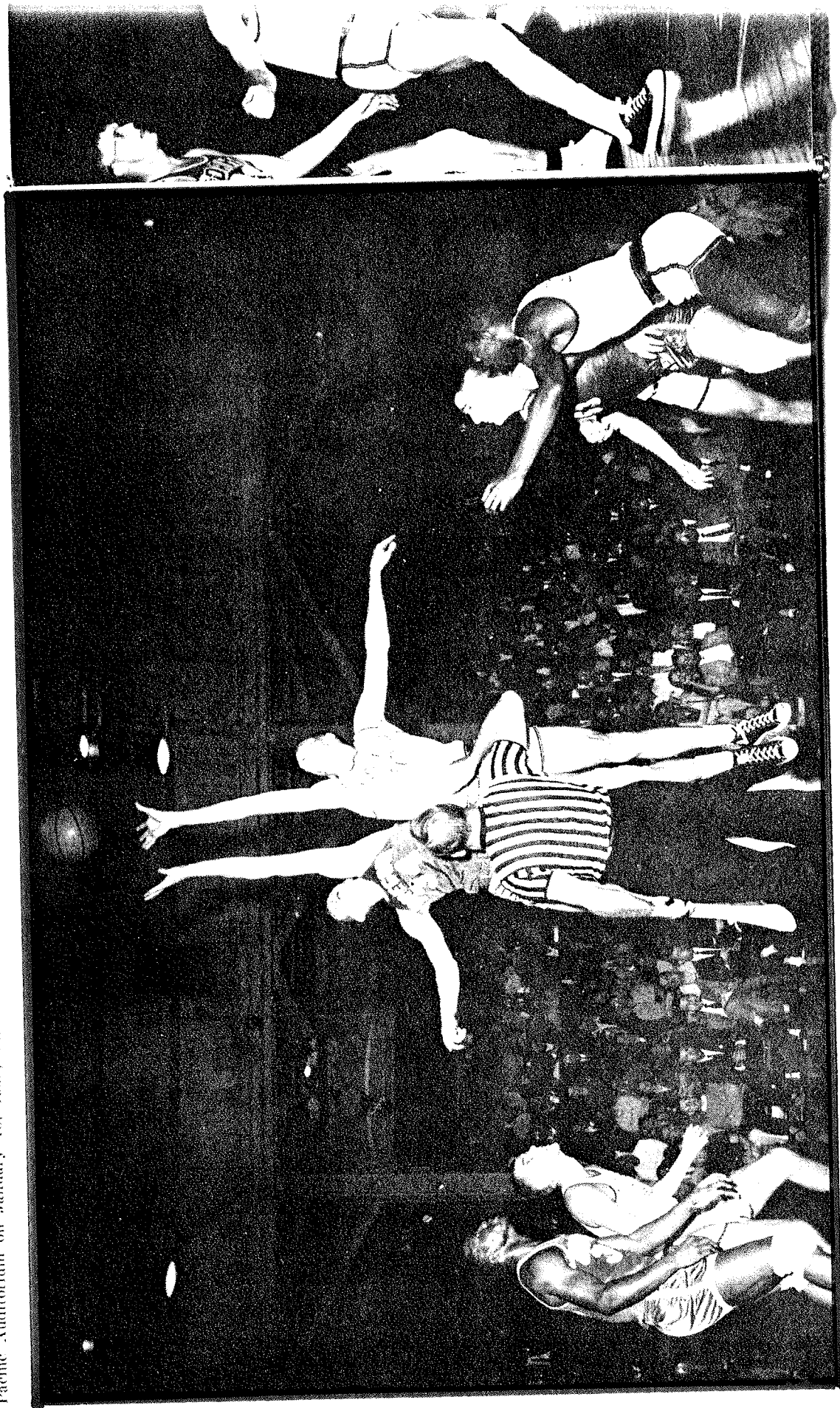

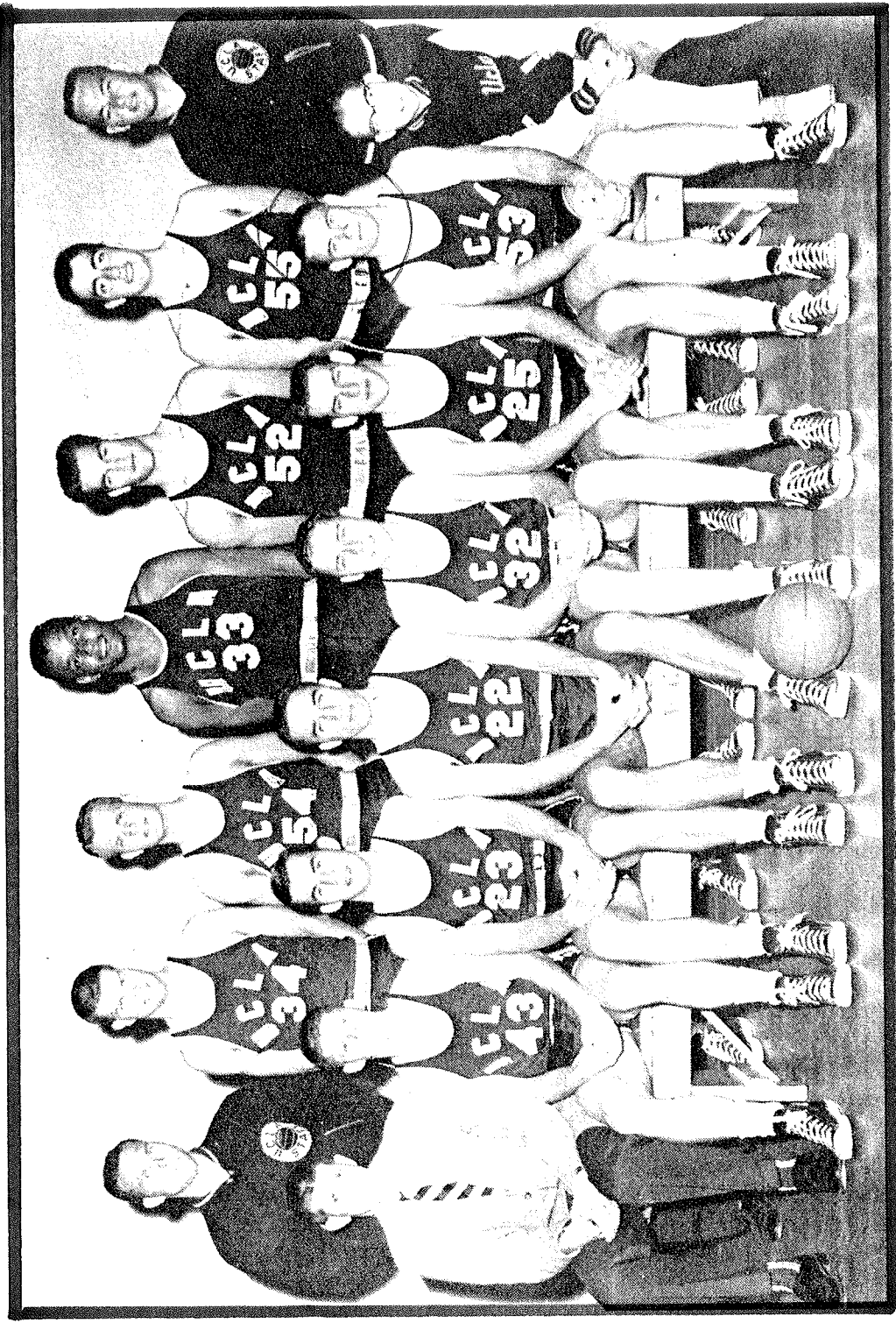

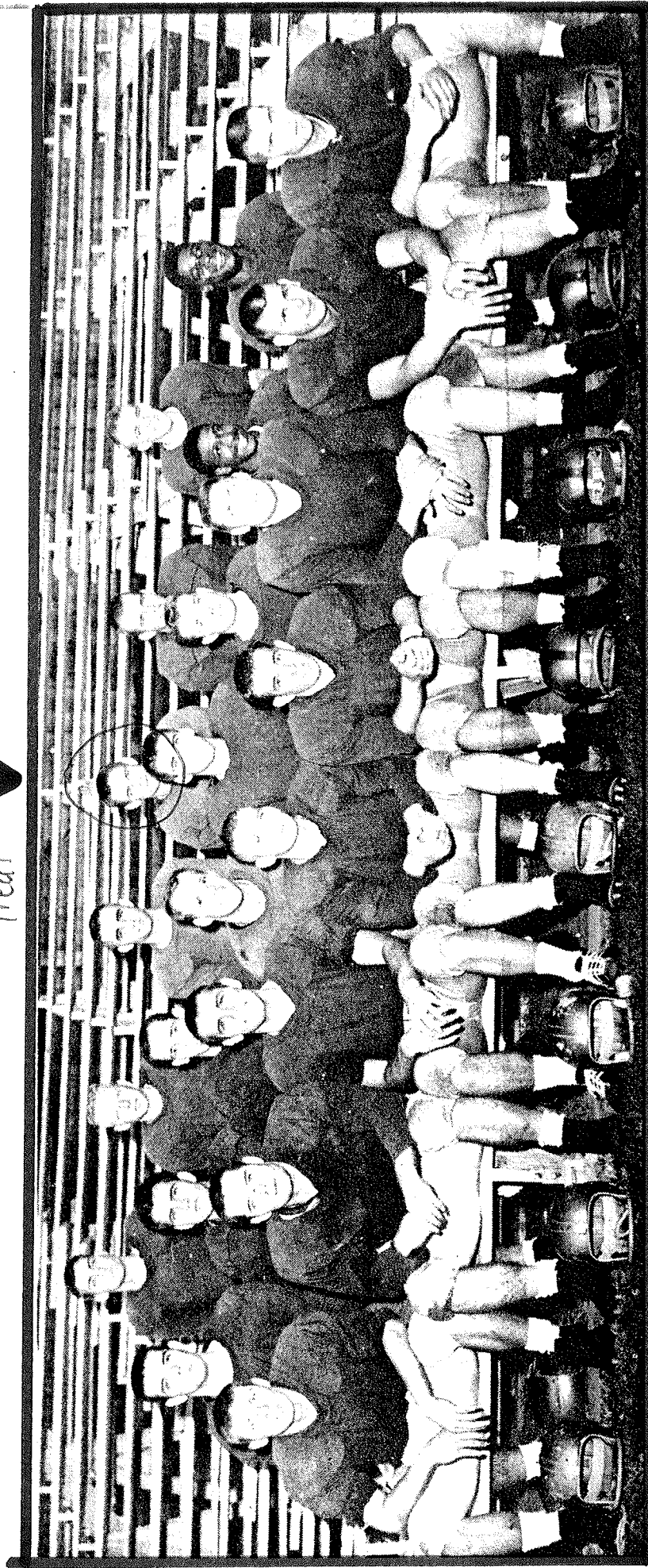

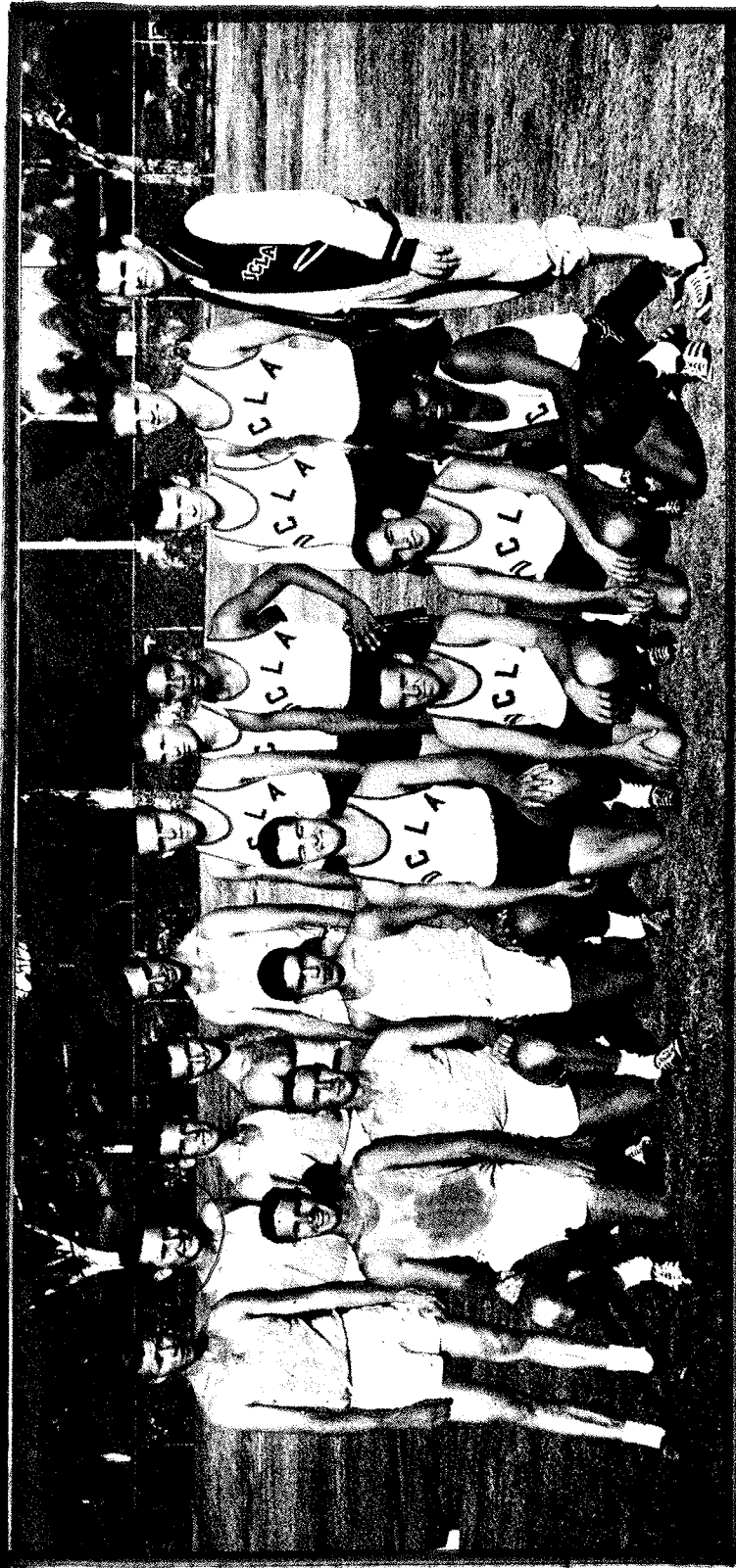

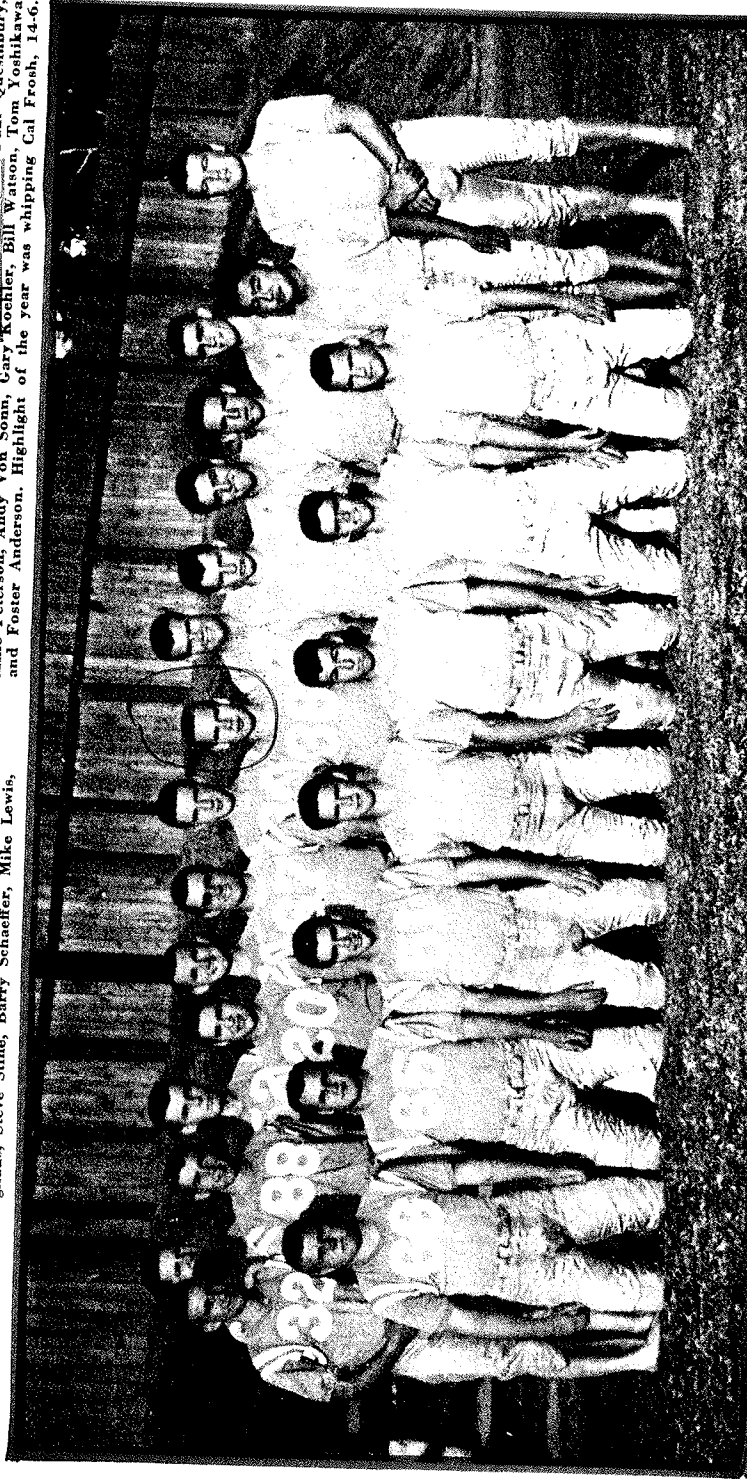
Victory Over Cal Highlights Frosh Year

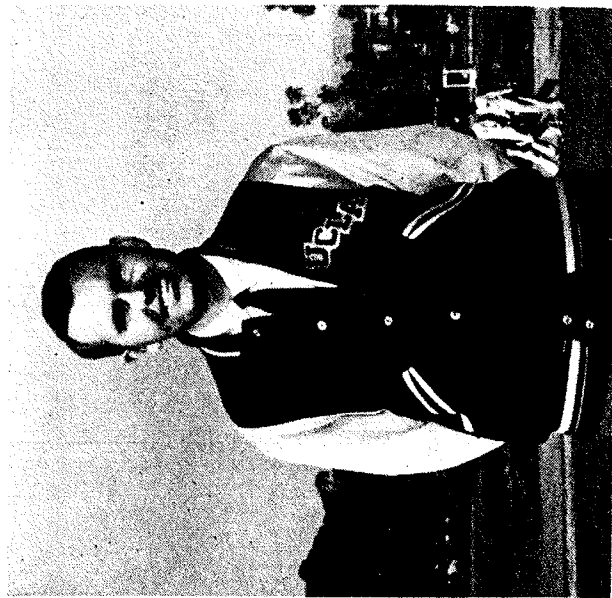

Talented Frosh Squad Sees Winning Season

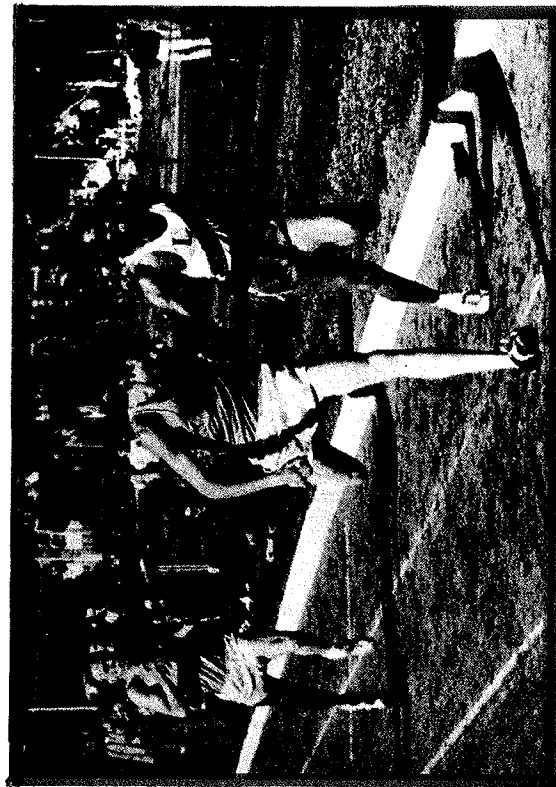

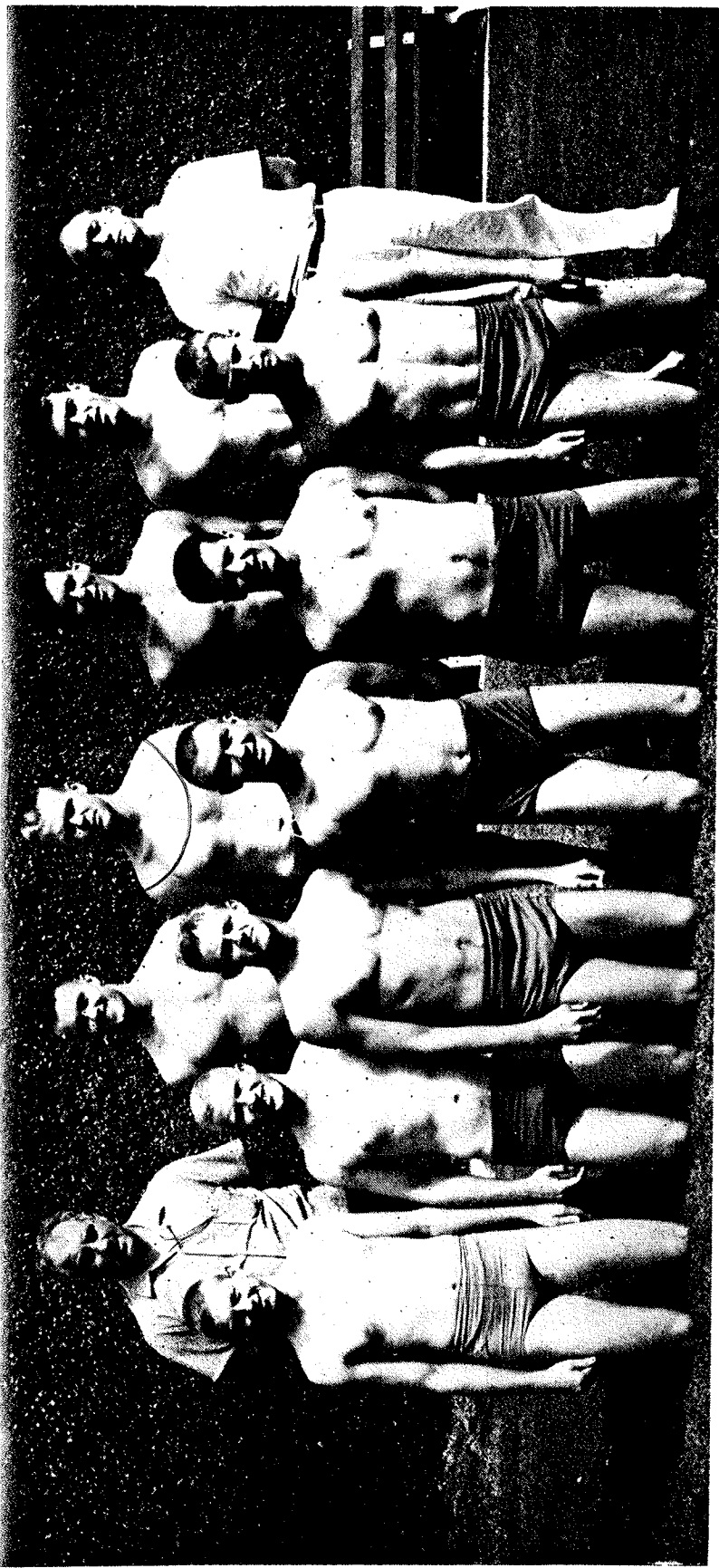
