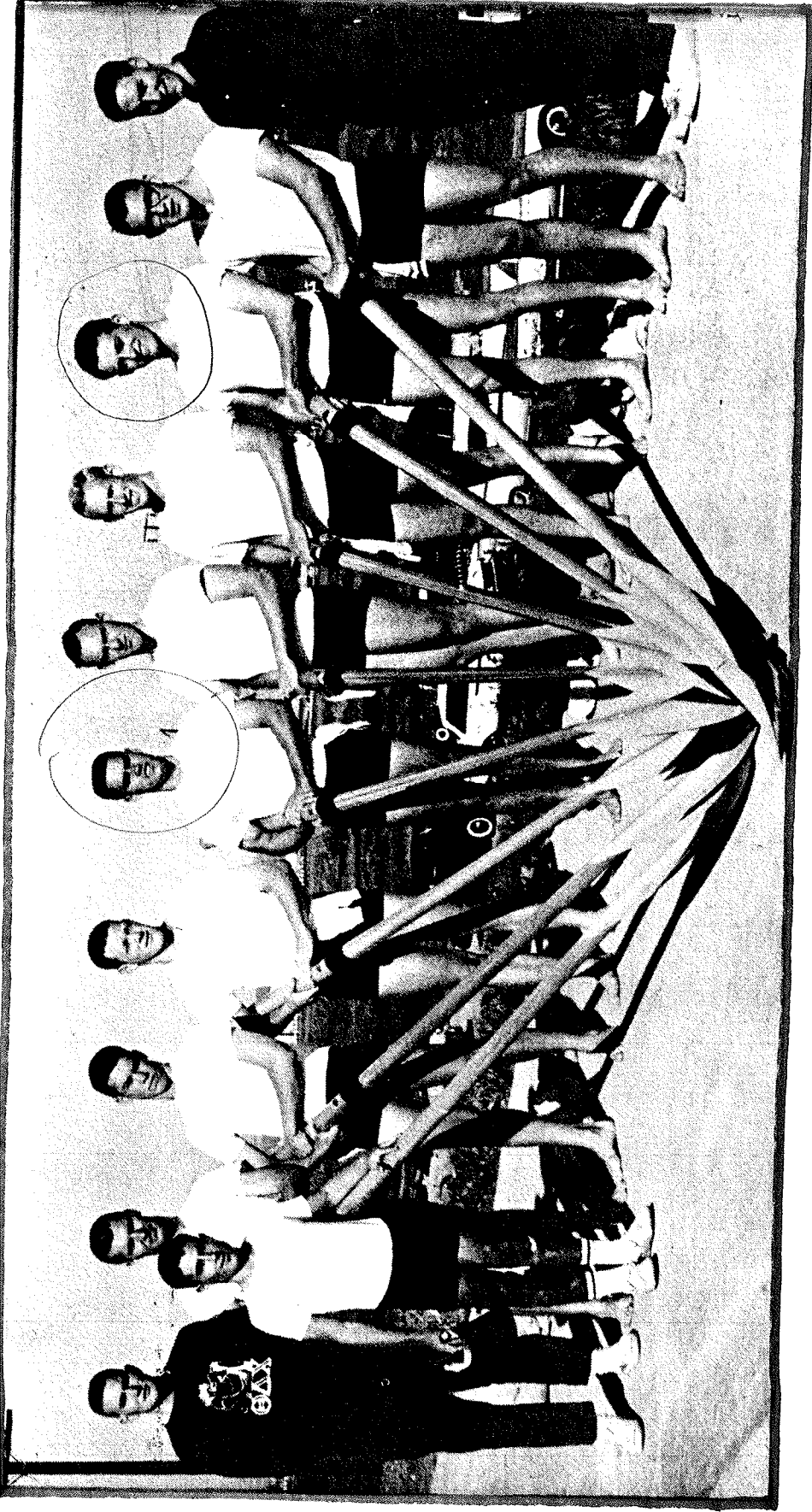

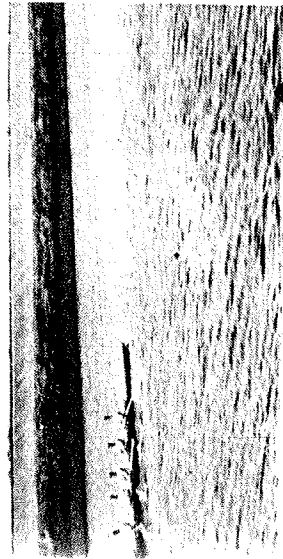

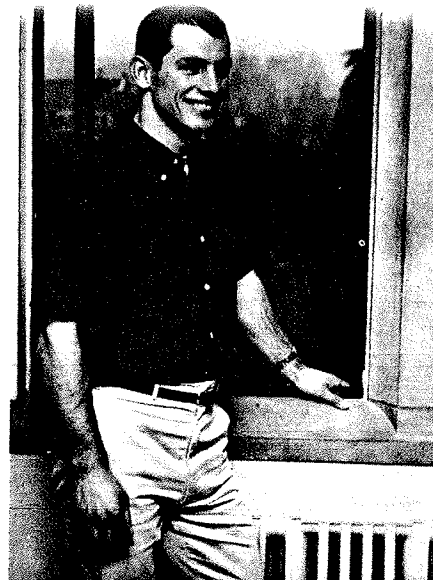
This year's young and inexperienced crew was the strongest in UCLA history. Because of an unusually large turnout, competition

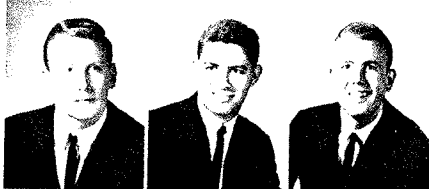

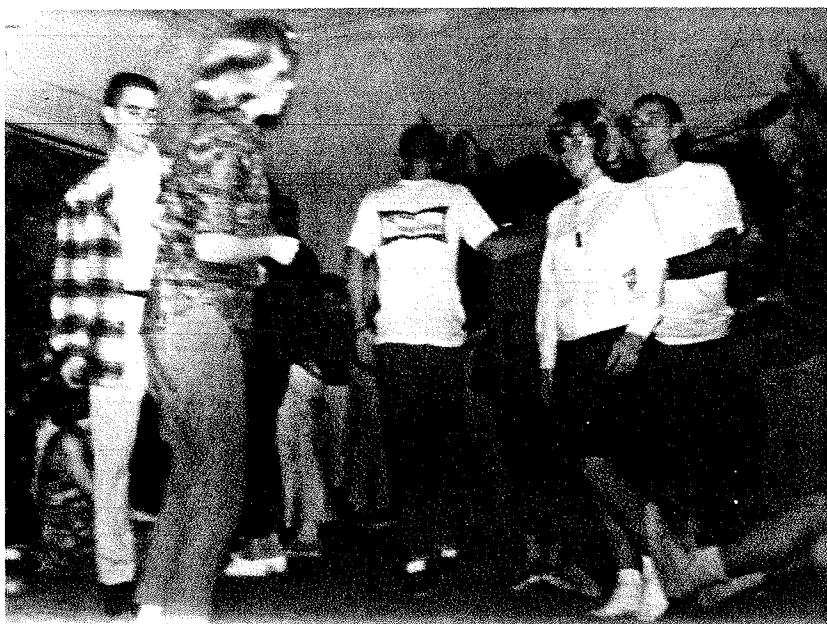

Founder's Day brought back Alumni to renew memories.



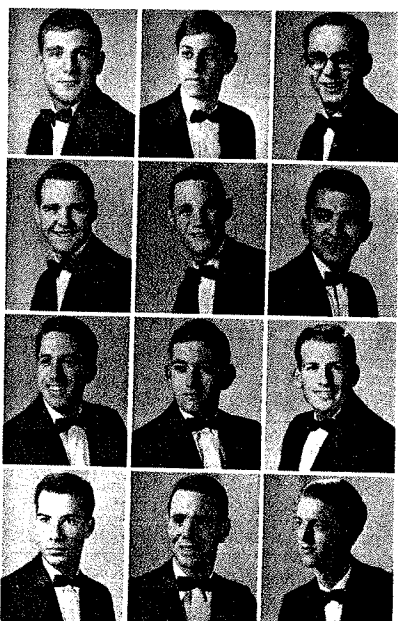
In the late hours of exchanges, some found difficulty in standing, much less dancing.

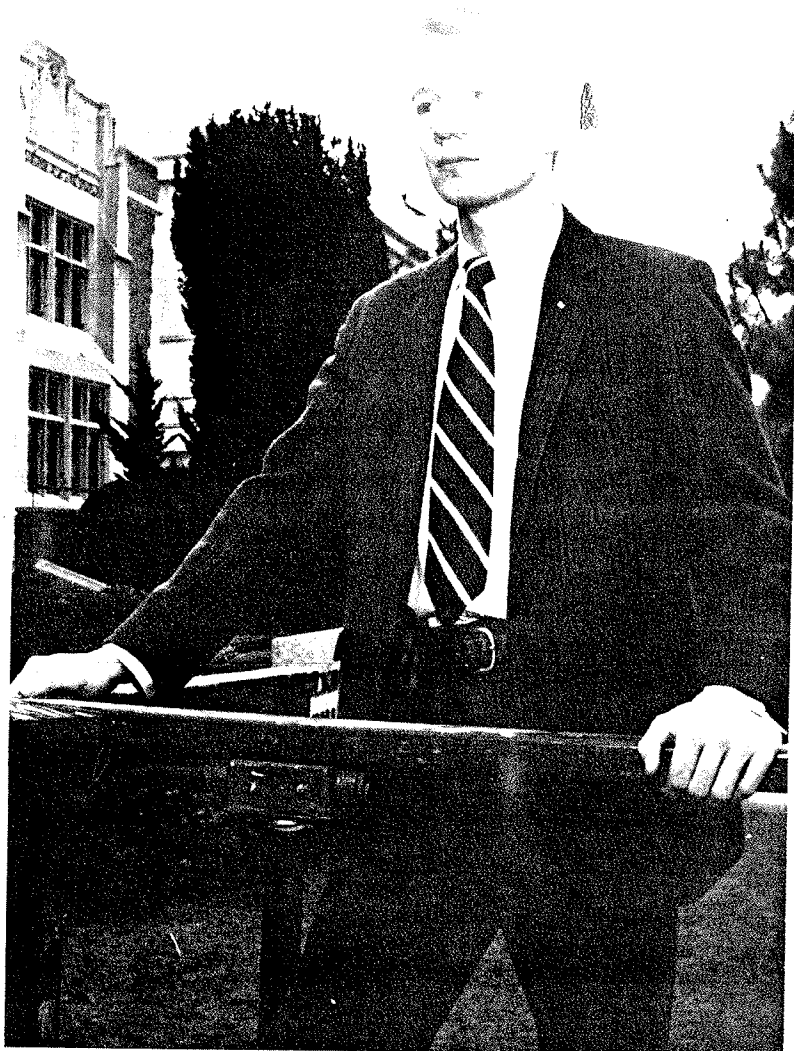
This year has left the usual scars upon the minds and bodies of the men of Sigma Pi.

Several bawdy wenches tricked brothers into pinnings and engagements, but those of us who survived these social diseases look anxiously towards another year at UCLA.



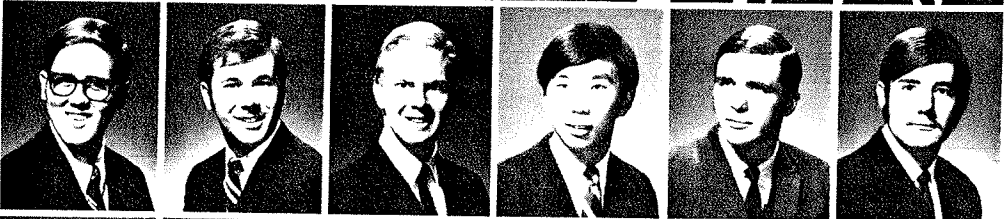

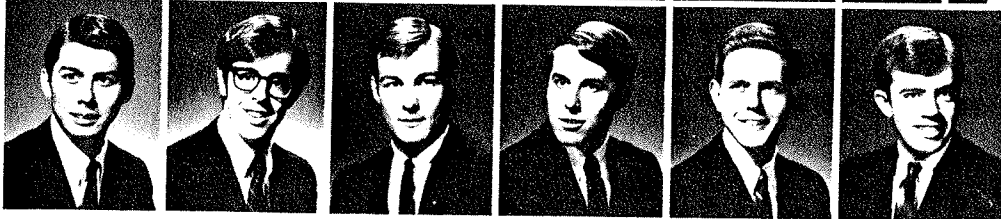
